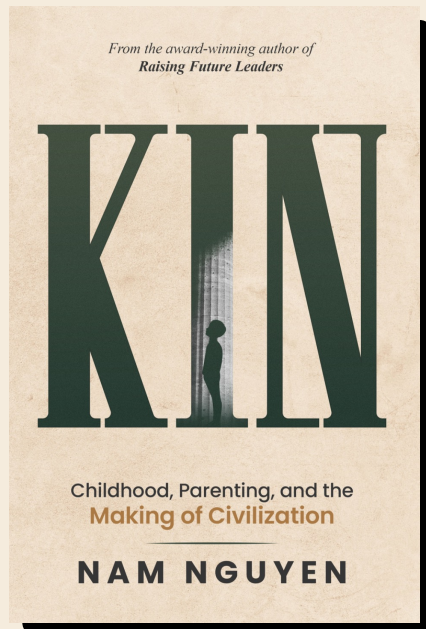


**THE BIG IDEA**
